Subject

Who or what the sentence is about

Example Sentence: The dog ate a treat.

Subject: The dog

Verb

What the subject is doing

Example Sentence: The dog ate a treat.

Verb: ate

Independent Clause

- A group of words that has a subject, a verb, and expresses a complete thought
- Can stand on its own

Example: I like pizza.

Dependent Clause/ Subordinate Clause

- A group of words that has a subject and a verb,
 but does NOT express a complete thought
- Can only exist with an independent clause

Examples:

- After I ate pizza...
- ...so I wouldn't have homework
- Since the Panthers won...

Simple Sentence

Has one independent clause

Example:

The turtle is happy.



Compound Sentence

Has TWO independent clauses





Example:

The turtle is happy, but the frog is sad.

Complex Sentence

Has one independent clause

AND one dependent clause



Example: Since my mom is a dentist, she makes me floss a lot.

(Independent, Dependent)

Compound-Complex Sentence

Has two independent clauses AND one dependent clause

Example: Since my mom is a dentist, she makes me floss a lot and I hate it.

(Independent, Dependent)

The sun is shining.

The sun is shining.

SIMPLE

When I went to the beach, the sun was out, so I put on my

sunglasses.

When I went to the beach, the sun was out, so I put on my

sunglasses.

COMPOUND-COMPLEX

When the sun is out, I wear sunglasses and sunscreen.

When the sun is out, I wear sunglasses and sunscreen.

COMPLEX

The sun is shining and the sky is blue.

The sun is shining and the sky is blue.
